## *A Loving Family for Every Child in Our Lifetime*

The UN Convention on the Rights of the Child (UNCRC) reiterates and confirms the knowledge and research findings concerning children and child development that children's development in a *nurturing family environment is the most fundamental need and right* (Article 5). The UNCRC also reiterates the State's obligations to arrive and facilitate the parent's responsibility for the child's upbringing (Article 3:2, 24, 26, 27) – and this constitutes “Family Strengthening”. In the event that children are unable to be cared for in the family and are deprived of their family environment, the state is obliged to intervene and the child is entitled to special “alternative care, protection and assistance” – such as foster care, adoption, Kaffala (Article 20). The UN Committee on the Rights of Children interprets this Article 20 as stipulating that institutional placement of children should be seen as a very last resort, considering that there would be some children for whom child care institutions (CCI) may be the only option.

### **Did you know?**

- ❖ Approximately 2.7 million children between the ages of 0 and 17 years are estimated to be living in residential care globally, or 120 children per 100,000.
- ❖ It is theorized that over 80% of these children are not fully orphaned and have at least one living parent or relatives / extended family members. In many cases, these family members could care for their children if given the right need-based support.

The 2019 Resolution on the Rights of the Child was adopted by the UN General Assembly on 18 December 2019 with a focus on children without parental care. The Resolution urges States to strengthen child care, protection systems and improve care reform efforts. This includes global efforts to redirect policies and services towards family-based care and reduce the use of institutional care, since the adoption of the CRC, UN Convention on Rights of Persons with Disabilities (CRPD), and the UN Guidelines for the Alternative Care of Children. Close to 200 non-profit organizations were signatories to this including the Miracle Foundation.

### **Orphan Crisis in India**

A study has found that 4 per cent (or 20 million) of India's child population are orphans. Most of these children have been abandoned by their parents. It further estimates that only 0.3 per cent of these orphans are children whose parents have actually died. National Commission for Protection of Child Rights (NCPCR) commissioned a social audit across 7,163 CCIs in the country. The report focused on assessing the compliance by institutions to the JJ Act and rules on registration, funding, child protection measures and infrastructure. The key findings included:

- As many as 2,039 or 28.5% were not registered with the state governments as mandated by the Juvenile Justice Act, 2015.
- Only 52% CCIs have adequate number of counsellors, just 49% were steered by enough critical first line of care-givers – the house mother and house father.
- 26% (1,883) CCIs had adequate number of child welfare officers, probation officers, case workers and 45.5% (3,256) had a medical officer or physician including the ‘on call’ doctor.

- 2,764 (38%) CCIs did not have adequate measures to prevent any form of physical and emotional abuse of children.

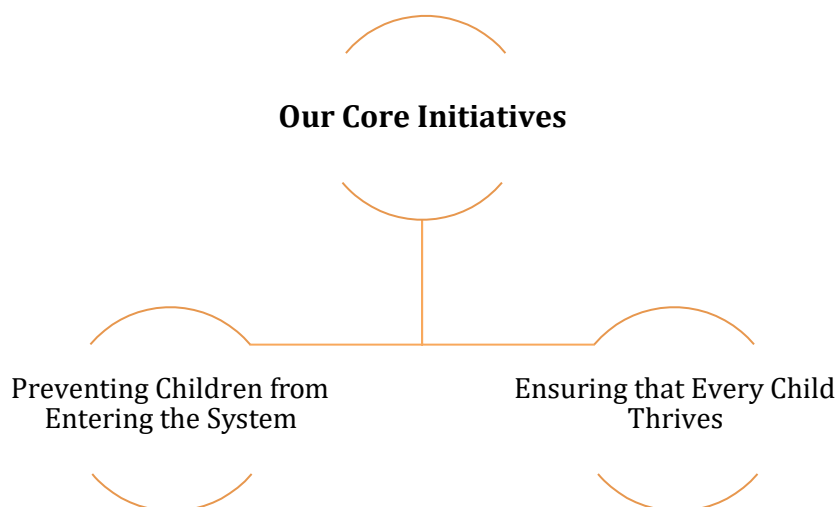
The emotional, social and physical development of children has a direct impact on the overall development of the country. Understanding the status of children is thus of immense importance. The high proportion of orphaned children highlights the fact that poverty is a major reason behind the situation. Every child has a basic right to live in a safe, loving and non-discriminatory environment and to grow in a healthy and dignified way.

### Miracle's Theory of Change: Every Child Belongs in a Family

A section 25 registered non-profit company, Miracle Foundation India supports orphaned and vulnerable children to have a better quality of life while bringing about sustainable changes that reduce the need for CCIs. Keeping in mind the objective of

loving family for every child, we are exploring avenues to reunite children with parents or relatives when possible. At the same time, we are working at the prevention level to prevent children from entering the orphan crisis in the first place.



## Ensuring that every child thrives

Miracle Foundation India has evolved and learnt that there is a critical need to transition from Institutionalized Care to Family Based Care. Children deprived of a family are:

- Highly vulnerable to abuse
- Susceptible to attachment disorders,
- Cognitive impairment, mental health problems, such as depression and anxiety
- Have IQ 10 points lower than average.

While working with CCIs in India we realized that in order to facilitate this shift, we had to expand and focus more on two rights of the child along with the child's other right to education, healthcare, nutrition and protection from safety and abuse.

### The Right to Live in a Family

- Children thrive when they grow up in families surrounded by love, support and security. They are better off in a family with less resources than in the best of institution.
- Children growing up in a family with personal care have a higher IQ, form better emotional bonds which are stronger and more trusting. They also have better physical growth, cognitive function, and social-psychological health.
- Little thought is given to how children growing up in institutional care will be reintegrated back in the community and lead lives as independent adults. The process of placing children in families will ensure sustainability in their upbringing and certainty of their future as adults.

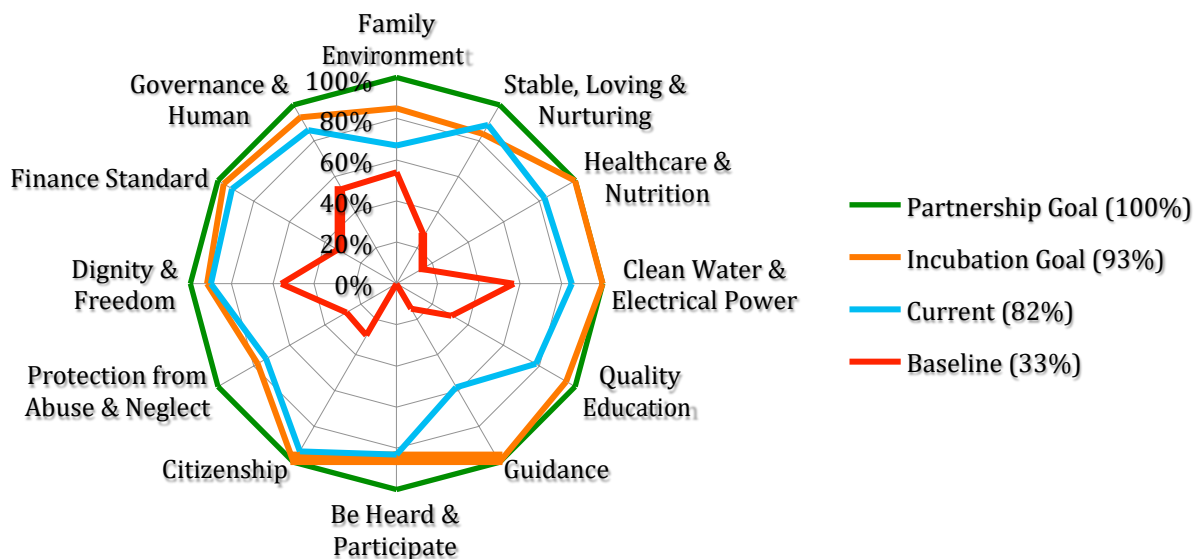
### The Right to a Safe & Loving Environment

- Miracle-supported CCIs are the top 3% of institutions in India which have strict child safeguarding policies. There are many institutions where children don't even receive the basic physical needs. Emotional needs and attachment bonds aren't given any priority.
- All too often, CCIs are privately run, unregulated by State authorities – part of an opaque money-making system, in some cases linked to trafficking networks and other illegal practices. This exploitation is increasingly recognized as a form of modern slavery.

# Approach & Methodology

## Our work at the CCIs

Until all children are in a loving family, we will continue to make sure they thrive wherever they are. We have a measurable, repeatable and systematic method to ensure that children living in institutions thrive. There is special focus on education, nutrition and healthcare, family environment and child protection. Our proven Thrive Scale methodology is based on the 12 UN Rights of the Child and leverages data and technology to ensure that orphaned and vulnerable children reach their full potential.



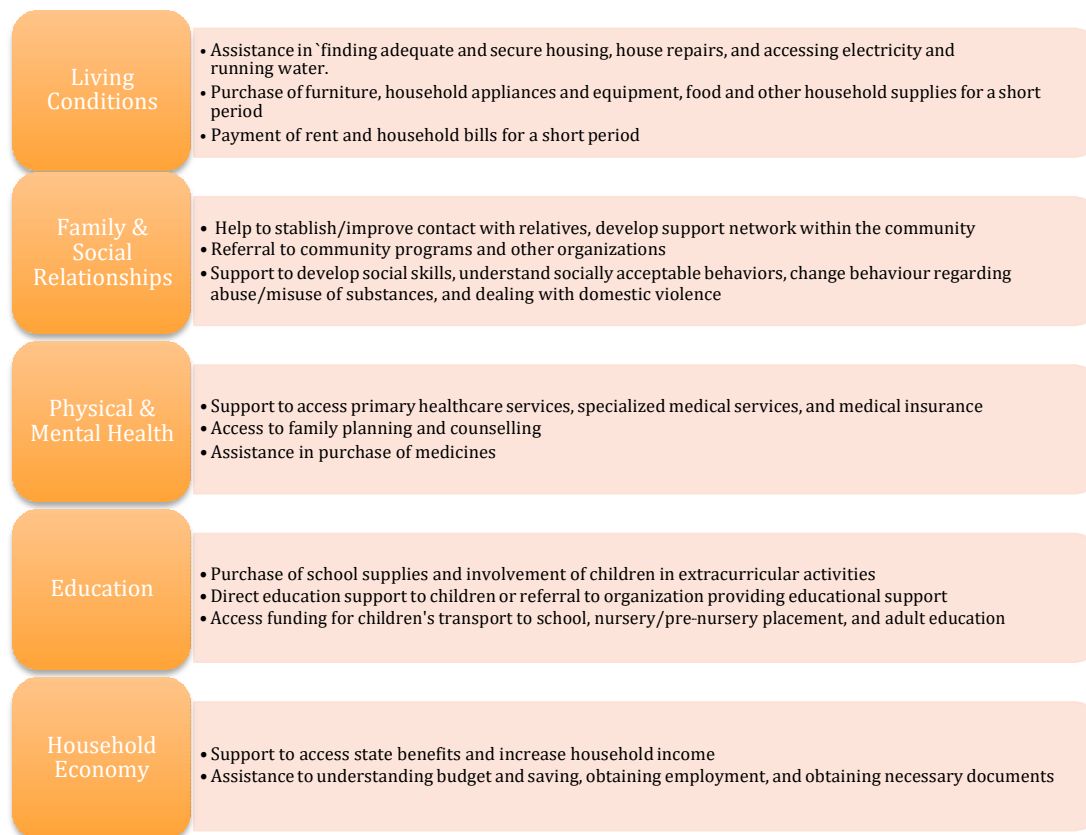
The approach of Miracle is that of a supportive mentor. Miracle team members interface with the children home at regular intervals to improve the quality of care being provided to the children as well as work with the CCI team to come up with an intervention plan for the family and track the progress.

## Our work in the families/communities

The two essential components of transforming a CCI into a community care model is developing family-based care and developing community based services to support children and parents at risk in a timely and sustainable fashion. This program is unique and holistic, built on the following core values: partnership, respect, inclusion, sustainability and the best interest of the child. The purpose of this program is to:

- Identify and prevent children at risk of being separated from parents
- Reintegration of children from institutions back into family care

Families referred to this program are helped to assess their strengths and needs across five wellbeing domains:



Based on the outcomes of the assessment, families are engaged in developing a support plan and are assigned a support team consisting of social workers, pedagogues and psychologists who work intensively with the parents and the children for a set period of time. It focuses on the family's strengths as well as its challenges.

The average duration of support is seven months, during which time a family is usually visited 18 times by a social worker and six to 18 times by an educationalist (a pedagogue or psychologist). Families also receive support in form of essential supplies such as children's clothes, nappies, and household equipment such as water heaters or kitchen utensils.

The model is evidence-based and the support to family should not be long term and standardized, but it should be short term and based on individual needs of the children and families. Therefore a strategic plan is needed to make this support sustainable, and community plays an active role in mobilizing the resources.

## Support requested: The Need for Higher Education

About 99% of the children, we support in the communities and CCIs are first generation learners. They belong to remotest locations with no access to education, healthcare or other opportunities. Their families are extremely poor, consist of a single parent (often single mother) or no parents, or are separated from family due to prevailing circumstances and lack of resources. The importance of education in becoming independent adults and breaking this cycle of poverty is thus given utmost importance.

We strive to instill high expectations in them, their parents and their caregivers for their future and give them opportunities to tread on that path. Our education strengthening program is very elaborate and covers every step from access to primary and secondary education, school supplies, transportation, uniforms, career counselling, aptitude tests and computer literacy program as well. The coaching support which we offer under our intervention ensures that the children receive individual attention and support relevant to their academic needs to strengthen their foundation.

They are supported, encouraged, and given access to higher educational opportunities (university or vocational training) based on their aptitude, which leads to employment and help them become self-sustaining adults. We continue to support our children through vocational training, higher education and transition to adulthood and gainful employment. Our interventions are driven by data and we procure all academic performance related data etc. to track the progress of every child. This also included aptitude test scores, counselling reports, computer literacy certification etc.

### Career Assessment

- Miracle Foundation India enables children in classes 10 & above to identify and pursue higher education/vocational courses based on the results of their aptitude test assessment.
- An outsourced professional counsellor analyses and discusses the results of the aptitude tests with the children, their caregivers/parents and the CCI leader. They help them to understand the array of career options that the child will have potential in and what are the appropriate courses to help them establish their goal.

### Higher Education Courses

- Supporting children with higher education course fees, accommodation and living expenses, travel expenses, coaching support, education materials, etc.
- The education facilitator with the guidance of Miracle India's Education team identifies colleges, fills out admission applications and determines the other nits and grits in helping the children begin college.
- Scholarships are awarded to children who apply and meet the eligibility criteria set by Miracle India. A student who is unsuccessful in his/her scholarship application will still receive funding from the Miracle Foundation through regular funding covered under higher education.

### Vocational Training/ Skill Development

- In few cases, the child might not show inclination towards studies and is advised to take up vocational courses along with computer, English language classes etc. to pave the road to a successful career.
- Children who are interested to take up vocational/ skill training are encouraged to do so.
- Children with learning disabilities are also motivated to take up vocational courses for a self-sustainable future.

### Monitoring of Children in Higher Education

- Miracle India is always connected with the children to ensure that they are doing well in their studies. Regular monitoring is undertaken to ensure that they are settled in the society and able to confidently take care of themselves.
- The children write quarterly progress updates to keep us updated about their developments. The education program team also meets with the children every quarter to check on their progress.

### Enhanced Transition Programs

- To prepare children to live in the mainstream society after they turn 18 years old, counseling to make them comfortable and confident to face challenges is provided. They also given exposure to various community and institutional settings in the society, and provided counselling and support for entering the professional world.
- We provide transitional services once they complete their education and settle in jobs. The support can be varied in nature and wholly depends on the need of the child. For example, if a child needs a supplementary English Language class to help enhance his/her chances at employability, we will help them enroll in one.
- Miracle India and the CCIs maintain timely and regular communication with each child to track their progress and ensure them moral and emotional support. The CCI submits a quarterly progress report of all the children pursuing higher education to Miracle Foundation India.

In the academic year 2021-22, 189 children will be supported by us for higher education and vocational training. Like a family, we stay in touch and in regular communication with the children and help transition them into adulthood. Our effectiveness is measured by the outcomes of these children as they settle in society with a secure job, fixed salary, a decent place to live, and in future when their children have access to these opportunities without needing any intervention.

### **Monitoring**

The current scenario and a need for going digital has prompted us to move our work to an online mode where the children in communities and CCIs can continue to benefit from our interventions. We've been working to set up a digitally enriching infrastructure where these children will have access to education and career counselling opportunities remotely through tablets and a stable internet connection.

The staff checks in once a week with the children in families to ensure their health and safety. For monitoring of education as well, the CCI team will be in regular touch with the children via phone calls and video calls to support the process whenever required. Miracle team will follow up with the CCI team to get updates on children's learning.

Additionally, child safeguarding will be ensured during this entire process for safety as well as for an enhanced learning experience.

### **Program Outcomes**

- Every child has completed higher education and settled as income generating individual
- Children with aptitude for vocational training are equipped with the necessary skills and secured jobs
- Children are equipped with future employability skills
- Children will break from the cycle of poverty and prevent future generations from getting in the orphan crisis

### **Sustainability**

We are constantly adapting our program to continue ensuring what is in the best interest of each child. Hence, as we strengthen our infrastructure to provide support on higher education opportunities digitally and remotely, the children in CCIs as well as in communities will continue to benefit from this initiative.

This model will then be further refined to incorporate our goal of ensuring that every child grows up in a loving family while continuing to receive educational support, psychosocial support, life skills, and other skill sets remotely.
